



CONTINUING EDUCATION Expertise in the context of cultural and world heritage impact assessments

(Heritage Impact Assessment – HIA) with a special focus on World Heritage Sites

Venue: partly online and in-class modules in Vienna, including a site visit to Castle Heiligenkreuz-Gutenbrunn

(online: September 10 and 13, in-class: September 18 - 20, 2024)

The course will be held in English.

COURSE OUTLINE

BACKGROUND

In order to protect a heritage site, it may be necessary to prepare special evaluation reports in the course of the planning process, so called *Heritage Impact Assessments* (HIA). Consultants who are entrusted with carrying out such assessments learn about the process of this kind of impact assessment as part of the training. The basis of this training is the *Guidance and Toolkit for Impact Assessments in a World Heritage Context, 2022* that was developed as part of the *World Heritage Leadership Program* together with UNESCO (as well as the World Heritage Advisory Bodies ICOMOS, ICCROM and IUCN). The workshop will introduce the contents of the current guidelines and teach the participants how to use the Toolkit for Heritage Impact Assessments (HIAs) in the context of World Heritage. The principles and processes of the HIA presented through the new *Guidance* are likewise applicable for heritage places that are not on the World Heritage List and to heritage issues in wider Environmental Impact Assessments (EIAs).

HIA - HERITAGE IMPACT ASSESSMENTS

Heritage Impact Assessments (HIAs) are a vital tool in the management of heritage properties. World Heritage sites (referred to officially as 'properties') also face increasing pressures and threats arising from proposed change, especially including development, which, if not properly planned and assessed, can cause severe damage to the attributes which support their Outstanding Universal Value (OUV), sometimes irreversibly. Proposed actions, including new infrastructure or construction projects, can be crucial for conservation, management and/or to provide economic and social benefits, and therefore the goal of impact assessments is not to prevent change, but to support well-informed decision making and sustainable outcomes. HIAs provide a logical and rigorous framework for identifying ways in which adverse impacts may be avoided or mitigated and for determining whether an action or a project should proceed in the planned manner. In a World Heritage context, the aim of an HIA is to avoid adverse impacts on the OUV and other values.


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












COURSE OBJECTIVES

The main objective of the workshop is to provide participants with know-how and procedural guidance to learn the tools to conduct a proper Heritage Impact Assessment (HIA). It aims to impart basic know-ledge on how to prepare an HIA in accordance with the current UNESCO criteria for World Heritage properties. After completing the course participants should have an understanding about the importance of HIAs as an essential planning tool and be able to establish the essential principles for an HIA. They should be in a position to assess the impacts of a project in relation to the OUV, other values and attributes of a World Heritage site and determine whether there is a potential threat that could adversely affect the attributes that make up the OUV of cultural and World Heritage properties. The seminar will also provide a basic understanding of the planning, examination and assessment of projects in World Heritage properties, their buffer zones as well as in their wider setting.

CONTENT

The modules of the training will deal with basic HIA principles and processes and introduce the World Heritage concepts of OUV, attributes, authenticity, integrity, and protection and management. Heritage Impact Assessments will be presented as an important management and protection tool for cultural and World Heritage properties. As stated above, the aim of this impact assessment provides a framework for identifying ways in which adverse impacts may be avoided or mitigated and for determining whether an action or a project should proceed.

TARGET GROUP

Members of ICOMOS, Planners in architectural and engineering firms, staff of public and local authorities, managers and staff of cultural and World Heritage properties involved in EIAs and HIAs, investors and developers.

METHODOLOGY

The course will introduce the new *Guidance and Toolkit for Impact Assessment in the World Heritage Context, 2022*, and explain its principles and procedures through a mix of presentation based teaching combined with interactive discussions and exchange, as well as some group exercises to provide participants the opportunity to apply these principles and procedures outlined in the new *Guidance* to a locally relevant (but fictitious) case study.

PREREQUISITS FOR PARTICIPATION

Basic understanding of the relevant legal issues or practical experience.

STRUCTURE OF THE COURSE

The course has a multi-phase structure and comprises 4 phases in which the basic principles and processes for the preparation of an HIA in the context of World Heritage properties are taught and developed using case studies.

Phase 1

Online Modules 1 and 2 are conducted online to create a common understanding of the requirements for World Heritage and the identification of OUV, other values and attributes.

Phase 2

The in-person workshop teaches the entire impact assessment process through the use of a fictitious development case study at or within the setting of a real or fictitious World Heritage property. An outline impact assessment will be developed. Participants will produce a scoping report based on the OUV and attributes analysis from Phases 1 and 2, and will be supported through a consultation session with the resource people which the participants may utilize optionally.


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












Phase 3

The presentation of the final impact assessment report, where participants will become peer reviewers for other presentations, will mark the last phase.

Content: Kick-off, welcome, introduction to the programme

Procedure, tasks, introduction to the new *Guidance and Toolkit for Impact Assessment in the World Heritage Context, 2022*

Module 2: September 13, 8.00-11.00, online

Content: World Heritage concepts, HIA and national/local heritage

Outstanding Universal Value (OUV - three pillars: criteria and attributes, authenticity and integrity, protection and management), obligations under the 1972 *Convention concerning the Protection of the World Cultural and Natural Heritage* (in particular Articles 4 and 5), *Operational Guidelines* (in particular paragraphs 118bis, 172), the role of ICOMOS, case study presentation, presentation *Guidance and Toolkit for Impact Assessment in the World Heritage Context, 2022*, basics of impact assessment: The 11 Steps, screening, determining whether an impact assessment is required and scoping the HIA terms of reference, generic terms of reference

Module 3: September 18, 9.00-19.00, in-person workshop, visit of Heiligenkreuz-Gutenbrunn

Content: visit to Castle Heiligenkreuz-Gutenbrunn, Statement of OUV (SOUV), basic evaluation, OUV, other values, attributes, limits, *Tool 1*

Basic assessment, OUV, other values and attributes, use of *Tool 1*, example from the region, factors influencing the property, facilitated discussion on establishing the baseline, analysing the SOUV for the case study property and restructuring the attributes into the table format, attributes, OUV, understanding context, boundaries, World Heritage property, its buffer zone, wider setting, case study as an example

Module 4: September 19, 9:00-17:30, in-person workshop, TU Vienna

Content: group of interest, determining the effects, Tools 2 and 3

HIA process, input rights holders and stakeholders, stakeholders and methods of engagement, identification and prediction of potential impacts and mapping of attributes in *Tool 2* table format, review by site manager of case study property, mitigation and enhancement, iterative process of using *Tool 3* for project planning, topic workshops in groups

Module 5: September 20, 9.00-20.00, in-person workshop, TU Vienna, final dinner

Content: application of Tools 1-3 and legal basis, final report

Resumé *Tools 1, 2 and 3*, mitigation and enhancement, iterative process of using *Tool 3* for project planning, reporting, review, decision making, Yes/No decision, paragraph 172, technical reviews, legal contexts and triggers for HIAs, legal situation on the ground, group workshop writing the final report of the HIA case study based on guide and toolkit accompanied by the trainers

CERTIFICATION

Participants who successfully complete the course receive a Certificate of Completion from ICOMOS International.

LANGUAGE

The course will be held in English.



Nicholas Clarke



Nicholas Clarke is an architect, academic and director of Heritage Futures, a heritage consultancy based in the Netherlands. He obtained his professional degree at the University of Pretoria (South Africa), continued his studies at the University of Cambridge (United Kingdom) and defended his PhD thesis at Delft University of Technology (Netherlands). He has worked in practice in South Africa, the United Kingdom and the Netherlands and taught at the University of Pretoria and Delft University of Technology. In 2023 he was a visiting professor at La Sapienza University in Rome, Italy, and is currently a research fellow at the University of Pretoria. His publications include award-winning books on architectural heritage and its conservation. His architectural practice includes restoration, reuse and impact assessment with a particular focus on cultural heritage and sustainable development, as well as World Heritage. He serves as an ICOMOS World Heritage Advisor and is the elected Treasurer of ICOMOS South Africa.

Richard Mackay



Professor Richard Mackay, AM, is an ICOMOS World Heritage Advisor, Honorary Member of ICOMOS and co-author of the Guide and Toolkit for Impact Assessment in the World Heritage Context produced by the UNESCO World Heritage Centre and Advisory Bodies under the World Heritage Leadership program. Professor Mackay has undertaken missions working on impact assessment, tourism and management of World Heritage sites in Europe and the Asia-Pacific region. He is a former Chair of the Australian World Heritage Advisory Committee, Member of the Australian Heritage Council and was the Convener of the ICOMOS Global General Assembly held in Sydney in 2023. He was made a Member of the Order of Australia for his services to archaeology and cultural heritage.

Ulrike Herbig
